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Longtime Volunteer's Legacy Lives on with the Music Always Fund

Marie Sansone Zucchero

was something of a celebrity at Bethesda Dilworth. She volunteered there for more than 40 years, playing the piano and bringing her gift of music to residents with her fellow Ding-a-Lings, a choir of volunteer and resident singers Marie founded. They serenaded residents and staff every Thursday with classic songs of their youth that haven't been played on the radio in decades.

In fact, to honor her years of extraordinary support and service, and specifically her commitment to the residents of Bethesda Dilworth, Marie received Bethesda's prestigious Norwood Award in 2007.

"Everyone at Dilworth knew Marie," **Amy George Rush,** Marie's

second oldest grandchild, says. "It was like walking around with a celebrity in the halls of Dilworth. It was heartwarming to see my grandma be a kind of rock star at the nursing home."

Amy first started coming to Bethesda with Marie to visit her great-grandmother, Marie's mother, who suffered from advanced Alzheimer's and was living at Bethesda Dilworth. Marie would play her favorite Italian songs for her mother and noticed some of the other residents enjoyed her music by the piano as well.

Over the years, Marie began attracting a larger crowd of residents, staff and volunteers to join her for sing-a-longs at the piano. Eventually, she started the Ding-a-Lings.

Music Always Fund

Lovingly nicknamed "Mama Dia" by her granddaughters, as in "mother of the day," Marie is described as the quintessential mother figure. She was incredibly giving with her time, talent, and kindness, and she loved spreading joy through her passion for the piano. And playing it for *her* residents.

"There was nothing that could stop Mama Dia from coming to play at Bethesda on Thursdays," says **Mary Noel George,** Marie's third oldest grandchild. "Inclement weather didn't matter. She wouldn't plan any other activities on Thursdays. Nothing stopped her from singing with her Ding-a-Lings for over 40 years."

And when Marie passed away earlier this year, her five granddaughters established the Marie Sansone Zucchero Music Always Fund, an endowed fund of \$50,000 to honor Marie's memory, thereby ensuring that residents at Bethesda always have the gift of music.

The "Always" in the Music Always Fund name comes from the song

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Vaccine Progress Brings New Normal to Independent Living

As of early May, more than 96% of residents throughout Bethesda communities have been fully vaccinated with the COVID-19 vaccine. For residents living in Bethesda's independent living communities, this vaccine progress, along with the overall increase in vaccinations, has allowed Bethesda's transportation services, which have been mostly shut down for the past year, to resume.

Prior to the pandemic, these residents enjoyed group trips to the grocery store, art museum, restaurants, and many other St. Louis destinations for socialization and fun activities. To ensure resident and staff safety, these trips were halted during the height of the pandemic.

Michelle Glass, Corporate Vice President of Senior Living and In-Home Services, says stopping transportation beyond necessary medical appointments was important to keep Bethesda residents safe—the risks associated with group activities was too great. Now, she is excited to see transportation and activities safely start back up again.

"I think having transportation running again brings back the independence to independent living," Michelle says. "Residents no longer have to depend on family or staff to help them with groceries, and they can know they are safe doing it now."

At Bethesda Barclay House, General Manager **Barb Jackson** had to get creative to help her residents get what they needed once transportation

services stopped. Resident **Patricia Melechen** was unable to get groceries for herself with no transportation of her own or nearby relatives to help.

"I'm grateful for Barb because without her help I don't know how I would have gotten any groceries," Patricia says. "We started a weekly routine where I would bring her my list and she would order my groceries for delivery."

Barb says the hardest part about the pandemic has been the lack of resident socialization. Exercise classes are popular with the residents, so the Bethesda Barclay House team got creative and added several classes each week to properly distance residents while keeping the classes open.

Now that so many residents are vaccinated, everyone is looking forward to loosening restrictions on social activities. Patricia looks forward to returning to her favorite beauty parlor, the art museum and weekly grocery trips.

"I'm looking forward to social outings resuming so residents can get out of their apartments and enjoy a change of scenery," Barb says. "We've been able to open our dining room to allow four people per table and that has really helped with socialization."

Bethesda is continuing to offer COVID-19 vaccinations at all six independent living community to ensure new residents and employees have access to the vaccine. Michelle says she would like to see everything back to normal for independent living residents by the end of the summer.

"I hope to see no limits other than room capacity on activities," Michelle says. "I'd like to see family coming and going as they please, and residents safely getting back to their active and fun lifestyles."

BETHESDA

Independent Living Provides Safety and Security for Seniors

For many residents, living in a Bethesda retirement community offers comfort and socialization opportunities that they would not have living on their own.

Last year presented many challenges for seniors and their families, causing feelings of loneliness and isolation to sharply increase. This time has been especially worrisome for people who do not live in the same area as their loved ones.

Lynn Burkhart's 93-year-old mother, **Rita Scherer**, started having difficulty doing some tasks for herself and was feeling lonelier than usual at the beginning of 2020. Rita was living alone in Wisconsin, where Lynn was born and lived before moving to St. Louis.

"My son and I are the only surviving relatives left in my family, and it was hard knowing my Mom was so far away," says Lynn. "She and I had some tough conversations, but ultimately decided together it would be best for her to move to St. Louis."

Lynn and Rita looked into a few different retirement communities in St. Louis, but ultimately decided Bethesda Orchard was the perfect place for Rita.

"The friendliness of the staff at Bethesda Orchard made us both feel so at ease with our decision. My mom is still very independent, so she loves having her own apartment, but the peace of mind knowing someone would be there to help in an emergency is really nice," Lynn says.

Rita moved into Bethesda Orchard in June of 2020. They

utilized Bethesda's "Moving with Ease" program, which provides move coordination, including packing and unpacking; downsizing and design assistance. Residents receive a \$3,000 allowance to help cover the costs of these services.

"It was really just me doing most of the work to move my mom to St. Louis, so having help and support from Bethesda's moving team was incredible," says Lynn.

Since moving in, Rita has enjoyed going for walks in the Webster area to admire the beautiful gardens and flowers in bloom at many neighborhood homes. Although she doesn't have a car, Rita is still able to be an active participant in the local community, frequenting the farmers market, shops and bookstore by foot.

"People here have been so nice and friendly, it made the transition quite easy," says Rita.

"My mom has settled into her new home nicely. She loves playing Wii bowling with her neighbors, she has a group of residents that she plays cards with every Friday night, and she attends the exercise classes a few days a week," Lynn says. "I'm really glad to have her close to home, and it's nice being able to see her more often and spend time together doing things she loves."

Like many of the Bethesda seniors who have been fully vaccinated, Rita is excited for things to get back to normal so she can participate in more socialization activities and meet more of her fellow residents.

"I keep hearing about all the fun things Bethesda used to plan for us and I can't wait for things to return to normal so I can experience the fun first-hand," says Rita.

Dear Bethesda Meadow,

In 2016, our family was thrown into a scary situation—our mother had to be placed in a skilled nursing facility. We knew then this would be where she should live out her last days.

Bethesda Uses Local Job Fairs to Fill Open Positions

Over the last year during the pandemic, Bethesda has participated in multiple virtual job fairs, often partnering with local organizations like the Urban League of Metropolitan St. Louis, Missouri Job Center, and local community colleges and universities.

In May, however, for the first time in over a year, Bethesda participated at in-person job fairs, which are preferable because they provide optimum opportunities for recruiters to meet and talk with the candidates face-to-face.

"Job fairs are a great way for Bethesda to connect with the community," says **Eileen Caffey**, Bethesda's Director of Recruitment and Employee Relations. "When people in St. Louis are looking for a job, we want them to be so familiar with Bethesda that we're the first place they think of applying.

"The main positions we're hiring for are true caregivers like certified nursing assistants (CNA), licensed practical nurses (LPN) and registered nurses (RN), but we also have open positions in our corporate office and in entrylevel positions like maintenance, housekeeping, transportation



and activities," Eileen says. "We are absolutely willing to train people for those entry level roles; we just want to hire people who are passionate about caring for others."

In addition to training courses, Bethesda offers the "Career Ladder" program, a workforce development initiative for people who are interested in furthering their careers in healthcare. Participants begin with a class to become a CNA (see photo on p. 5) and have the option to work their way to becoming an LPN or an RN though a tuitionreimbursement program.

Bethesda is fortunate to have hired more than a few amazing employees from job fairs in recent years, like **Dontell Spears**, a driver at Village North Retirement Community.

"A few years back, my fiancé saw an Urban League job fair being promoted on social media, and I decided to attend to see what kind of positions they were hiring for," Dontell says. "The two women I met from Bethesda were so kind and inviting that I knew this was going to be the right fit for me."

Dontell started working in March of 2019 as a driver, and he says he has enjoyed getting to know his coworkers and the residents over the last two years.

"I had never been a driver before this job, but I've really fallen in love with it," Dontell says. "The relationships I've built with the residents make me excited to come to work each day."

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"Always," composed by Irving Berlin in the late 1920s. Marie and her husband's first dance at their wedding was to this song, and it became her favorite throughout her life. When it came time to name the fund, including "always" was a natural fit to *always* keep music a central part of the Bethesda community.

"We wanted to start the Music Always fund to honor Mama Dia and her legacy of music and service at the place she loved to play most," Mary Noel says. "We want music to continue for the residents for years to come."

Due to COVID-19, the Ding-a-Lings have been unable to sing together for the past year. However, **Darla Neely**, Volunteer Coordinator at Bethesda Dilworth, is hopeful that they will be able to sing together again soon.

"A lot of residents have been asking when the Ding-a-Lings will perform again," Darla says. "It's safe to say we are all very eager to hear them sing again, because whenever we hear them sing, we all think of Marie."

In the final weeks before she passed away, Marie was still taking requests and playing the piano from memory for residents.

"Toward the end, when my grandmother couldn't remember what our names were, she had no problem remembering how to play practically any song without looking at the sheet music," Amy says. "She could just play like magic."
