Going "Above and Beyond" for Independent Living Residents

When an independent living resident goes to the hospital for a procedure or an emergency, the continuum of Bethesda support doesn't stop. The Care Coordination and Business Development teams work together to ensure that hospitalized residents are referred to one of Bethesda's rehab communities for their recovery.

Senior Care Coordinator **Julie Poelker** and Director of Business
Development **Carrie Wetzel** lead this charge.

A member of the Business
Development team visits the
hospitalized resident to review
the services Bethesda has to offer
(post-discharge rehabilitation, home
health, private duty) and coordinates
referrals with the hospital staff,
most often to one of Bethesda's
seven skilled nursing/rehabilitation
communities, for their recovery.

During the rehabilitation process, Julie and the Care Coordination team participate in care plan meetings, to understand the resident's situation and develop a plan to return home.

"It's our job to determine what Bethesda can provide and how we can get the resident back to her or his Bethesda home," says Julie.

Julie says that, despite the Business Development team visit, sometimes the resident or the primary caregiver still doesn't realize all of the services Bethesda provides, so she works with them to manage expectations and make informed decisions about next steps.

"I recall a Bethesda Orchard resident who was very independent prior to a fall," Julie explains. "Her therapist had recommended a move to an assistant living environment. The patient's daughter was taken aback by this recommendation, but I stepped in and assured her that we could provide help with everything the mother needed, while keeping her in her home at Bethesda Orchard. We would make sure her mom was taken care of. And she was, without the move to assisted living."

These valuable collaborations between Bethesda and area hospitals are unique. "There are not many groups that value coordination like we do," says Carrie.

"Family members tell us they know that we are looking out for their loved ones, which provides them with the peace of mind they need," says Julie.
