A Crowning Achievement—Two BJEC LPNs Obtain RN Degrees While Juggling Work and Family

Bethesda knows its nurses can do practically anything—just take **Alicia Edwards** and **Monica Hunt** for example. Both ladies have been doing triple-duty as licensed practical nurses (LPNs) at Barnes-Jewish Extended Care (BJEC), students earning their registered nurse (RN) license and moms at home.

Both wanted to pursue nursing from young ages. Alicia has worked with BJEC since becoming an LPN in 2015, while Monica joined BJEC six years ago after working as an LPN and administrative roles at a couple local rehabilitation facilities.

They say that the 18 months it took to obtain their degrees were grueling, but they are proud of themselves for persevering, especially considering that some of the challenges would have caused many to give up.

"I had a baby last year over spring break," says Alicia. "There were times I had to get up in the middle of the night to study because that's the only time I had."

Two motivational factors that got them through the RN program: career advancement and family.

"I wanted to inspire my three kids who have been a great support to me while I've been in school," says Alicia. "They'd tell me 'We're so proud of you. We know you can do it!' and let's just say there were lots of tears at graduation. It was a wonderful feeling."

Similarly, Monica wanted to prove to herself and her children that she could complete such an accomplishment.

"My children and I ended up swapping roles on occasion," says Monica. "I remember my daughter got onto me for studying while lying on my bed. She told me to get up and go study at the desk!"

Alicia and Monica both thank their BJEC/Bethesda family for their encouragement, flexibility and financial support through the process.

"Everybody from administration to maintenance staff were amazing," says Monica.

Alicia was awarded Bethesda's prestigious 2021 Presidential Scholarship. Launched in 2020, the scholarship helps an LPN advance in their career and achieve their RN license by granting up to \$25,000. This allowed Alicia to work part-time at BJEC and maintain her full-time pay during school. Similarly, Monica received tuition reimbursement from Bethesda for receiving high grades and working full time.

"At BJEC, you are constantly learning even when not taking classes," Alicia said. "With the nursing classes, I was challenged to look at things in a different way."

The next step for both women is to take the five-hour nursing board exams. Until then, both nurses are keeping focused and studying hard.

"I celebrated my graduation with a family vacation," says Monica. "Now that I'm back, I will focus on preparing myself for the exam."

"I'm ready," says Alicia. "I think we both are. We learned a lot with the coursework and in our jobs."

Bethesda Helps Housekeeper Fulfill Caregiving Aspirations

A passion for caregiving and the residents of Bethesda Dilworth led housekeeper **Ashley Henderson** to pursue her Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA) license through Bethesda's Career Ladder program.

"I knew I wanted to do more for the residents by becoming a CNA," says Ashley. After two years of watching others participate, Ashley decided to look further into the program and reached out to **Eileen Caffey**, Bethesda's Director of Recruitment and Retention, to express her interest.

"Many people would be intimidated to return to school.



But Ashley proved that if you have the determination to do it, you will be successful," says Eileen.

In the 12-week course, CNA candidates learn the clinical skills they need to care for residents. The program is a partnership with Applied Technology Service, an organization that specializes in adult education, and was a great fit for Ashley.

"Now that I've graduated, I'm excited to start my new journey. I want to do so much more and keep moving forward," says Ashley.

Ashley is now a full-time CNA at Dilworth. She hopes to continue with the Career Ladder program and become a Certified Medication Technician (CMT).

Home Health Provides Supplies to Grateful Patient

At Bethesda, a patient's recovery journey doesn't end when they are discharged from one of our rehab communities. With the help of the St. Andrews & Bethesda Home Health team, their transition back to the life they love has only just started. And this was especially true for 85-year-old **Denzil**, who first caught the attention of our team in June 2023.

Following a hospitalization, Denzil underwent rehabilitation at Bethesda Dilworth. After a few weeks, he was discharged and moved back home, where he would return to living independently. However, when Home Health team members came to Denzil's apartment for an initial assessment and to establish a care plan, they quickly discovered that his apartment lacked essential medical equipment and basic personal necessities needed to provide him with the best possible living environment.

They found Denzil walking without shoes, which was causing the wounds on his feet to worsen and increase the risk of infection. Clothes were being used in place of bed sheets, and he lacked proper cooking utensils and personal hygiene products.

After being made aware of Denzil's situation, **Missy McAuley**, Director of St. Andrews & Bethesda Home Health, approached the Bethesda Health Group Foundation in hopes of working together to provide Denzil with the critical

necessities he needed. She felt that the system had let a low-income senior slip through the cracks and was determined to help provide him with the home he needed and deserved.

Through the Marillac Mission Fund Grant, Denzil was gifted a full bedding set, bath towels, pots, pans, utensils, shirts, socks, and more. He was also set up with a bed rail to assist him in safely transferring in and out of bed, specialized surgical shoes to keep his wounds protected, and a lift chair and recliner to elevate his feet and help him to safely stand up.

"We hope that these items will help reinstate his dignity and, most of all, keep him as comfortable as possible while living independently in his home," says Missy.

Upon receiving the items from the Home Health team, Denzil was smiling from ear to ear as he expressed his thanks over and over again.

"I deeply appreciate the help and all items they've provided," says Denzil. "I'm so happy I could jump up and down—do somersaults down the hallway."

Denzil and his daughter, **Mary**, met the team with gratitude at every turn and new item that was presented to him. Denzil became quite emotional when he reflected on his journey and the support from the Bethesda staff.

"We appreciate that Bethesda cares enough to step in and do something like this," says Mary.


